HAVEN’S CRISIS AND SUPPORT LINE IS OPEN AROUND THE CLOCK, 365 DAYS PER YEAR. THE SUPPORT LINE PROVIDES CRISIS INTERVENTION, UNDERSTANDING AND SUPPORT, REFERRALS AND INFORMATION TO THOSE AFFECTED BY DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE.

IT TOOK COURAGE FOR JACQUELINE TO PICK UP THE PHONE AND CALL HAVEN’S CRISIS LINE.

When she did, she shared with me that her husband had strangled her, beaten her on multiple occasions, and threatened to kill himself if she ever left him. She tried to leave him five times, but each time she felt forced to return because of her financial situation. She cried when she told me she didn’t want her four children thinking it was okay for them to treat someone like that. Although it’s usually difficult to find space for five new people in HAVEN’s shelter, we had space that day. I approved her to come into shelter and didn’t expect to ever hear from her again. However, I saw Jacqueline and her kids every day out in the tech center, looking for work and housing.

# SHELTER

HAVEN'S RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM IS OAKLAND  
COUNTY'S ONLY 24-HOUR EMERGENCY SHELTER  
EXCLUSIVELY FOR DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL  
VIOLENCE VICTIMS AND THEIR CHILDREN.

WHEN I FIRST SAW KATHY, I WAS  
SURPRISED SHE COULD STILL TALK.

She moved into shelter just after having jaw reconstruction. As I stood over the pot of jambalaya I was making for the weekend, I smiled at her and introduced myself. She began to cry. I don't know if it was the pain of her physical injuries, my kindness toward her after she'd experienced terrible violence, or for simple release. She asked if she could have something to eat, so we decided to make soup together.

Kathy took soup making to a whole new level while living in shelter. After exploring HAVEN's organic garden, she harvested a bounty of herbs and vegetables to make new soups practically every week. When she wasn't busy in the shelter kitchen cooking, she focused her energy on healing her heart and her injuries and finding safe and stable housing. Several soup recipes later, Kathy got good news. A doctor had agreed to help her with her many injuries. On top of that, she had found housing with a friend.

Kathy left shelter as a happier person, with a future to look forward to and new hope. On the day she left shelter, she shared that she wanted to start her own business cooking for others. I knew her soup would be a best seller.

FORENSIC NURSE EXAMINERS AND FIRST RESPONDERS PROVIDE A COMPREHENSIVE FORENSIC EXAM AND COMPASSIONATE EMOTIONAL SUPPORT FOR VICTIMS OF SEXUAL ASSAULT.

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### CARA WAS ONLY 13 YEARS OLD WHEN HER NEIGHBOR SEXUALLY ASSAULTED HER.

Before that night, she had considered him her friend since they had attended the same schools growing up. Cara's parents drove her to the START clinic in Pontiac around 10 AM the following day and the forensic nurses performed a rape examination. Each year the nurse examiners at START see young adolescents who account for 20% of their patients. Most of these adolescents describe their assailant as their friend.

## SOCIAL ACTION

ADVOCATES PROVIDE SUPPORT AND EDUCATION FOR  
VICTIMS MOVING THROUGH THE LEGAL SYSTEM. FIRST  
RESPONDERS PROVIDE IMMEDIATE CRISIS INTERVENTION  
AND EMOTIONAL SUPPORT FOR VICTIMS AND THEIR  
FAMILIES AT OAKLAND COUNTY HOSPITALS AND POLICE  
STATIONS FOLLOWING AN ASSAULT.

### CARA THEN MET WITH A HAVEN ADVOCATE WHO HELPED HER CREATE A SAFETY PLAN.

They discussed the options available to her and decided to pursue a Personal Protection Order. Our advocate set up an appointment for later that day at HAVEN's PPO office (located at Circuit Court) and the family headed there to meet with another HAVEN advocate and fill out PPO paperwork. The PPO was granted without a hearing and HAVEN assisted with service. After the PPO was served, the assailant filed for a termination hearing to have the PPO revoked. HAVEN advocates attended the court hearing with her, and the PPO remained in place.

# COUNSELING

THE NON-RESIDENTIAL COUNSELING PROGRAM SERVES CHILDREN AND ADULTS WHO HAVE BEEN AFFECTED BY DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND SEXUAL ASSAULT. SPECIALIZED GROUPS AND INDIVIDUAL COUNSELING PROVIDE INFORMATION, SUPPORT AND INSIGHT INTO THE DYNAMICS OF ABUSE AND THE MYRIAD OF FEELINGS AND ISSUES THAT ACCOMPANY IT.

TIFFANY CAME TO HAVEN'S COUNSELING PROGRAM AFTER STRUGGLING WITH ANXIETY AND DEPRESSION RELATED TO SURVIVING AN ABUSIVE RELATIONSHIP.

Tiffany's main way of coping was to physically hurt herself. When I met with her for her first counseling session, we set some goals for her to manage her anxiety symptoms, understand trauma, and develop some healthy coping skills. Early in therapy, Tiffany also disclosed to me that she had been sexually assaulted by a coworker when she was a teenager.

After several weeks, Tiffany started opening up about her past and identifying many difficult emotions and negative thought patterns she had been avoiding. She learned how to start coping with them in healthier ways, such as mindfulness meditation and creative expression. Tiffany frequently used the meditation garden and meditation room at HAVEN before her counseling sessions as a way of grounding herself.

# PREVENTION EDUCATION

## ELIMINATING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ONCE AND FOR ALL

TRAINED EDUCATORS WORK WITH YOUNG PEOPLE, THEIR TEACHERS AND PARENTS TO EQUIP THEM WITH THE TOOLS TO BUILD RELATIONSHIPS BASED ON MUTUAL RESPECT AND TO UNDERSTAND WHAT CONSENT MEANS. EDUCATORS ALSO PROVIDE PROFESSIONAL TRAINING TO MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL PUBLIC ON THE DYNAMICS OF DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE, AND THE ROOT CAUSES OF GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE.

THE RESOURCE AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM USES STAFF, VOLUNTEERS AND OTHER HUMAN SERVICES PROVIDERS TO ASSIST SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE WITH ISSUES THAT AFFECT THEIR HEALING PROCESS. ASSISTANCE, RESOURCES AND LINKAGES ARE PROVIDED IN THE AREAS OF HOUSING, EMPLOYMENT, MEDICAL SERVICES, FINANCE, AND LAW. MONTHLY SERVICES OFFERINGS ALSO INCLUDE RESPITE AND EXPERIENTIAL ACTIVITIES. ADDITIONAL AID IS PROVIDED TO SURVIVORS NEEDING ASSISTANCE WITH COMPUTERS, HELP WITH FILLING OUT FORMS AND UNDERSTANDING QUALIFICATIONS FOR STATE AND FEDERAL PROGRAMS.

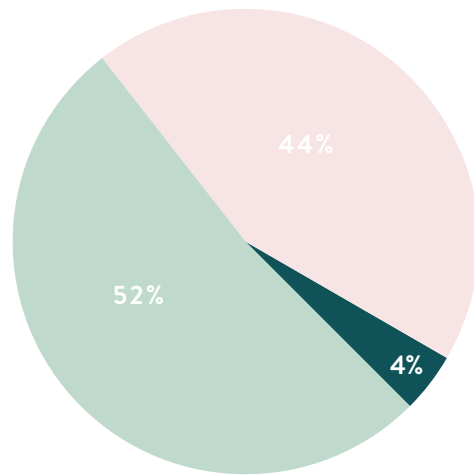

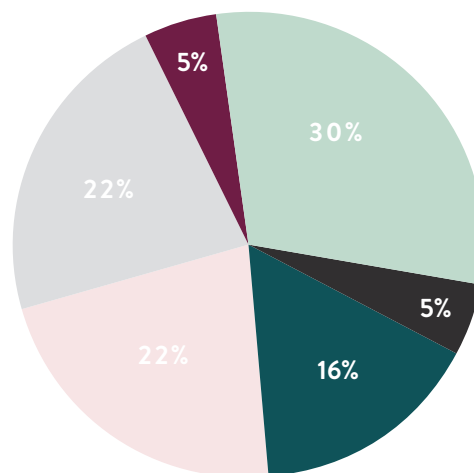

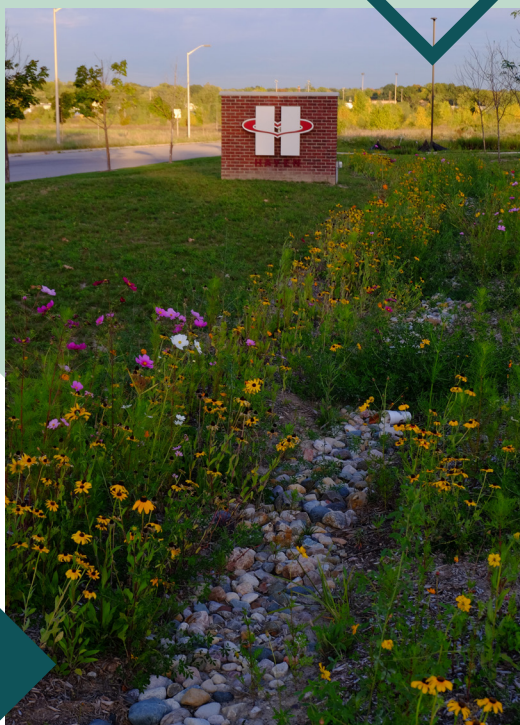
